The Pastor's Corner "When You Pray" A Message from Pastor Cheryl Raine

This Lenten Season, which starts with Ash Wednesday on March 5th, we will be exploring the Lord's Prayer through worship and educational opportunities. The Lord's Prayer is a prayer we recite every Sunday, yet do we really understand what we are saying when we pray it? Do we understand the implications of the pronouns of "our" and "us" in this prayer? Do we even know what "hallowed" means or what that requires of us when speaking of God's name or being present before God?

I have been joined by Rev. Dr. Shawn Zambrows, Rev. Sylvia Karcher, Rev. Rachel Reeder, and Rev. Karin Mazzeo in the planning of this Lenten Season. You will notice in our daily devotions these different authors, each sharing from their own perspective about a particular phrase or petition in the Lord's Prayer each week. I am so very grateful to be working with these wonderful pastoral colleagues in our community this Lenten Season.

Now, we all pray other prayers besides the Lord's Prayer, not only in corporate worship but also as individuals and groups outside of worship. From our experiences we know that prayer isn't just words, but so much more. It must be something more given that we are encouraged by the writers of First Thessalonians to "pray without ceasing," for this would only be possible if our whole lives were to be a prayer!

So, what really is prayer? Anne Lamott describes prayer this way, "Prayer means, that in some unique way, we believe we're invited into a relationship with someone who hears us when we speak in silence." She continues, saying, "So prayer is our sometimes real selves trying to communicate with the Real, with the Truth, with the Light. It is reaching out to be heard, hoping to be found by a light and warmth in the world, instead of the darkness and cold."




FIRST PRESBYTERIAN MONTHLY BOOK CLUB

It is not about knowledge; it is about being known by our God. As the psalmist reminds us in the chaos of our daily lives, "Be still and know that I am God." The Pastor's Corner



Prayer connects us with this mystery we call God and The Lord's Prayer is just one form of communicating with God, albeit the way Jesus taught his disciples how to pray. Yet, there are many other ways to pray as well because prayer is not only about using words. It can also take the form of silence or meditation, when we empty our hearts and minds of what we want and open ourselves to what God wants of us. Creating art or doing gardening can be a form of prayer, too. Some prayers happen through music or exercise or just by being immersed in the natural world.

Prayer also just doesn't happen when we close our eyes and bow our heads. Prayer happens when we are on our knees or when we are standing tall with our arms flung wide open skyward. During Lent I invite you to experiment with different body postures as you pray. Explore how different postures impact your prayers and notice if one body posture helps you open more easily to the whispers of the Spirit at work within you and around you. What posture helps you listen more attentively?

Anne Lamott reminds us that our prayers can be as simple as "Help," "Thanks," and "Wow." May this Lenten Season help us to be more attentive to the God whom we worship as we pray, as we commune with the Divine Lover who knows each of as a beloved.

Contemplative Corner Praying with the Gospel of Luke

Let us be attentive to the One who listens and responds to our prayers, even if the answer is "No" or "Not yet." As we prepare to start our journey through Lent this month, I offer this passage from Luke on perseverance in prayer for our reflection:

5-6 Then Jesus said, "Imagine what would happen if you went to a friend in the middle of the night and said, 'Friend, lend me three loaves of bread. An old friend traveling through just showed up, and I don't have a thing on hand.' 7 "The friend answers from his bed, 'Don't bother me. The door's locked; my children are all down for the night; I can't get up to give you anything.' 8 "But let me tell you, even if he won't get up because he's a friend, if you stand your ground, knocking and waking all the neighbors, he'll finally get up and get you whatever you need. [Luke 11:5-8, *The Message*]

The disciples asked, "Lord, teach us how to pray." Jesus responded by teaching them what we know as The Lord's Prayer. Then immediately following this teaching Jesus tells a story of perseverance. Have you ever had to ask someone repeatedly for something that you desperately needed like the one in Jesus' story? Have you ever asked God repeatedly through prayer for something? If so, how was your perseverance answered? Yet is asking with persistence the only thing that prayer is for? As we move through Lent this year we will be exploring prayer in the context of the Lord's Prayer. How do you persevere in prayer with both our asking and our listening? Let us be attentive to the One who listens and responds to our prayers, even if the answer is "No" or "Not yet."

As we start a new fiscal year, I thought I would take some time to provide a refresher on our financials. This month – revenue.

FPCR has two primary sources of revenue: donations and rental income. Rental income does not need definition but you might not know that while some of our rental income comes from infrequent users such as the Redlands Symphony, the Spinet Club or student recitals, approximately 65% of our monthly rental income comes from three renters: The Well (providing care for special needs adults in John Knox Hall Monday through Thursday), Optum (west parking lot) and TMobile (the cell tower on the top of the sanctuary). We are certainly blessed to have such a large property that can provide a source of income.

As to the category of Donations, this includes pledges (from those who filled out a pledge card last year), donations not from a pledge, and loose plate. Per Capita giving is also included in Donations.

What does <u>not</u> get reported in "Unrestricted revenues" are special gifts that are either given for a specific purpose (such as gifts to the Building Fund) and donations that will be passed on and not available for use for the church's operations, such as donations to the Deacons or other special donations to outside entities like Presbyterian Disaster Relief.

This month, revenues received were less than what was budgeted for the month and less than the expenses that were paid. Both our annual revenues and expenses are "lumpy" (a technical accounting term), meaning although the budget has been spread out evenly over the twelve months of the year, that is not how our donations come in or how our payments go out. Several of our donors pay less frequently than every month with some paying in a lump sum at some point to the year. Similarly, payments such are Per Capita and Insurance are paid either quarterly or in a lump sum. So one month does not a year make.



Sunday, March 30th Class is in Session


