To heal the broken,


To feed the hungry,



Jesus read from the Isaiah scroll at the start of his public ministry, proclaiming, "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because the Lord has anointed me to bring good news to the poor. The Lord has sent me to proclaim release to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor." This is the work of Christmas. These works invite us to participate in the mending of the world.

Together, I believe we are doing this work through the Outreach Share Ministry. We are tending to the lost, broken and hungry. We are mending the world in a small way by feeding those in need. We are also mending the world through our Deacon ministries as we support agencies working to mend the world like Family Services Association, Youth Hope, and Veterans Affairs. Our Deacon greeting card and prayer ministries also help mend the world. What other work might we be about? We must never lose sight that we are called to serve beyond our own walls by sharing the resources God has generously given us to help mend the world.

Yet, we must also remember that this mending is never done, for we live in the in-between time between God's incarnation as a babe born in Bethlehem and Christ's coming again. God's kin-dom is among us here and now, yet it will not be fully realized until Christ comes again. And so, the work of Christmas never ends. Our faith calls us to participate in acts of mending the lost, broken, hungry, imprisoned peoples and even nations by the power of the Spirit at work within us and through us.

There is much work to be done and my prayer for us this December is that the Holy Spirit will continue to prod us and equip us to do Christ's ministry of mending. Let's do the work of Christmas every day!

CONGREGATIONAL MEETING

December 1, 2024, Immediately After Service

On Sunday, December 1, 2024, the Session has called a congregational meeting to elect Elders and Deacons and to approve the Pastoral Compensation package for Pastor Cheryl for 2025. The congregational meeting will take place immediately following the All-Church Worship Service planned for that day, with a short technical break to end the Facebook Live feed.

It will be necessary to have a quorum to conduct business and according to the Book of Order a quorum is no less than 10% of the congregation for a congregational meeting. As of November 1, 2024, we had 142 members, so at least 14 members will need to be in attendance for us to have a quorum, which should a breeze! The meeting will also be available on Zoom, if you are unable to attend in person, and the link will be in the Saturday update.

Contemplative Corner Praying with the Gospel of Mark

In December we begin a new liturgical year in the church, moving from the Gospel of Mark to the Gospel of Luke. Yet, before we do, I would like us to consider the very beginning of the Gospel of Mark. This gospel does not have a birth narrative. This gospel is not included in the Advent and Christmas season, so I invite us to spend some time wondering why Mark started his gospel as he did:

"The beginning of the good news of Jesus Christ, the Son of God. As it is written in the prophet Isaiah, 'See, I am sending my messenger ahead of you, who will prepare your way; the voice of one crying out in the wilderness: Prepare the way of the Lord, make his paths straight,' John appeared in the wilderness, proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins."

What is the beginning of the good news for you? The words of the prophet Isaiah? "Look a young woman is with child and shall bear a son and shall name him Emmanuel" [Isaiah 7:14b] Or "For a child has been born for us, a son given to us; authority rests upon his shoulders; and he is named Wonderful counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace' [Isaiah 9:6]. Or maybe "A shoot shall come out from the stump of Jesse, and a branch shall grow out of his roots" [Isaiah 11:1]. Or "A voice cries out" [Isaiah 40:3]. There are even more words from Isaiah that speak to Advent. Or maybe the beginning of the good news takes place for you in the gospels with the angel visit to Mary or the dream of Joseph? Or is it the journey that Mary and Joseph take to Bethlehem?

What is the beginning of the good news for you? Spend some time reflecting on our faith story and notice when the good news takes root for you. Spend some time pondering and then enacting how will you live out the good news this Advent and Christmas Season. Let us bear the Christ Child's good news into the world this holy season.


So, what do these numbers mean? Our donations and pledges are less than what was anticipated at this point in the year by \$12,298. Our Net Unrestricted Income (NUI) was more than our expenses by \$6,203. The Adjusted NUI happens below the NUI line because the principal payments on our loan of \$6,535.88 YTD are not considered an expense for accounting purposes, although the principal payment does come out of our checking account. Therefore, at the end of October our Adjusted NUI was less than our expenses by \$333.01, that is, we have spent slightly more than we have received so far this year.

As the year draws to a close, to finish the year financially strong we will need our collective generosity to address the deficit, which may grow because of a large insurance payment that occurs in December. Yearend financial gifts need to be in the office or postmarked before the end of the year. We trust that God's provision will be enough for us as we rely on God's abundance. Our collective generosity and our community partnerships along with the movement of the Spirit among us make our ministries possible. Thanks be to God for our ministries.

Outreach - Christmas Joy Offering

On Sunday, December 22nd we will receive the PC(USA) Christmas Joy special offering. During the Advent and Christmas season, together we lift up past, present, and future leaders of the church. God has blessed the Church with incredible leadership in every time and place, but those leaders often need to be supported by their communities as well. This Offering addresses the support needed by some of our leaders, including supporting leadership development for communities of color, and providing support for Presbyterian church workers in their time of need. Here are some stories:

"Rev. Peggy Krong served the church for over fifty years. When she faced retirement had financial barriers that jeopardized her ability to move into the Mont Vista Grove Homes in Pasadena, California. A dear friend encouraged her to contact the Board of Pensions. The PC(USA) agency granted her immediate assistance by partially paying the retirement home's required entrance fee and later set her up with an ongoing Housing Supplement to help her manage the monthly fees. This support was made possible in part by the Christmas Joy Offering."

"The Presbyterian ruling elder and deacon Sue Ann Fairman of is a member of New Wilmington Presbyterian Church, which supported her and her former husband during their years as international mission workers. They lived and worked among the Maasai people in southwestern Kenya. It was there that Fairman cultivated a love for literacy, raised and homeschooled two daughters, and spent 14 of her nearly 25 years in mission service volunteering at Mother Teresa's Orphanage in Nairobi. When she was initially faced with the financial realities of moving into a senior living community, Fairman said she was feeling "more than a bit stressed." A trusted friends asked her, Why don't you apply to the Board of Pensions for income and housing assistance,' which she had never heard of before. Her friend explained it was there for retired pastors and mission workers if they were in financial need. When she made the call and they investigated her situation, they felt she qualified. Then Sue Ann wrote, 'When I got that letter that said I was accepted, I just cried. It meant that much to me. I cannot tell you how much this income assistance has validated me and my years of ministry!" Your gifts to the Christmas Joy Offering serve to validate their life and their ministry."
